While psychology did not emerge as a separate discipline until the late 1800s, its earliest history can be traced back to the time of the early Greeks. During the 17th-century, the French philosopher Rene Descartes introduced the idea of dualism, which asserted that the mind and body were two entities that interact to form the human experience.

The history of psychology as a scholarly study of the mind and behavior dates back to the Ancient Greeks. There is also evidence of psychological thought in ancient Egypt. A high level of work on mind-sciences can be found in Vedic scriptures of Sanatana Dharm (Hinduism), an application of certain principles as a part of yogic practices of India.

Ancient Greek philosophers from Thales(550 B.C.E.) through to the Roman period developed an elaborate theory of what they termed the psuchē(from which the first half of "psychology" is derived), as well as other (loosely speaking) "psychological" terms—nous, thumos, logistikon, and so forth (Everson 1991; Green and Groff 2003).
